

Fleet Spotlight: The Murphy Brothers, Patrick and Tim; FDNY, DEP, and Parks

This week, our newsletter spotlights Tim Murphy and Patrick Murphy, two brothers with long and storied careers with the City. Patrick retired earlier this year as a Deputy Director of Fleet Management after a 36-year career at FDNY, while Tim is now in his 31st year with the City. He is currently a Supervisor of Mechanics at NYC Parks truck repair shop on Randalls Island. Patrick spent his entire career with FDNY, while Tim began at DEP and came over to Parks during the shop and mechanic consolidation of 2013. Before their time with the City, both brothers immigrated to America from Ireland and worked in auto-mechanic shops in the private sector before joining their respective agencies.

Tim was a mechanic at DEP for twenty years and was promoted to Supervisor shortly after coming to Parks in 2013. However, he still has ties to his old agency. Tim oversees the mechanics working on over 300 DEP trucks and fleet units serviced at Parks 5 Boro. On any given day, his team will have between 10 and 12 trucks in their bays.

During his time at Parks, Tim helped to orchestrate several initiatives. Tim was instrumental in bringing diagnostic laptops and equipment into 5 Boro. Before this, trucks had to be sent to vendors for in-depth diagnostic work. It was beneficial for performing diesel particulate regenerations on diesel trucks. Diesel trucks accumulate soot in the diesel particulate filter that needs to be burned off every so often by allowing the engine to run at high heat. This process is known as regeneration. If delayed, the truck becomes undrivable. In those cases, Parks had previously vended out the needed repairs. Thanks to Tim, those can now be done in-house, saving transport time and money.



More recently, Tim was the driving force behind Parks bringing dielectric safety testing in-house for bucket trucks. Forestry and skilled trades workers use bucket trucks every day. Bucket trucks are insulated to ensure the operator is not harmed if the bucket touches a live wire. It is critical to make sure the insulation is in working order. This insulation is achieved by having a controlled charge of over

100k volts run through the bucket apparatus via a method known as dielectric testing. Tim helped establish an in-house capacity to perform this critical safety and lifesaving test.

While Tim was taking on Parks equipment challenges, his brother Patrick was doing the same at FDNY.

Patrick started as an Auto Service Worker in 1987 at FDNY Fleet and was eventually promoted to Deputy Director of Fleet. For 25 years of his career, Tim was a mechanic on the emergency response crew. Any fire designated with three alarms or higher will have its own emergency mechanic onsite and ready to quickly repair fire apparatus that needs servicing during a response operation.

Patrick has been onsite at some of the most notorious fires in our city's history. Most notably, Patrick was part of the crew that responded to the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001. Patrick was fortunate to survive that day. Like many at FDNY and in City government, Patrick showed extraordinary service, dedication, and courage. He returned immediately to Ground Zero for the next two weeks, where he and other mechanics worked to get dozens of firefighting units back to drivable so that they could be brought into the truck shop for decontamination and repairs.

Patrick is incredibly proud of his work in the days after that tragedy and his work to honor those who had fallen. Patrick assisted in constructing the 9/11 memorial at FDNY's repair shop in Long Island City. Also, he assisted in building the Caisson, an FDNY pumper that was retrofitted to carry the casket of FDNY members who died in the line of duty. Patrick recalls his time at FDNY Fleet as "the best job he ever had."

In retirement, Patrick has still been involved in the work he loves, volunteering with his local fire department in Rockland County. As for his brother, Tim loves to watch movies in his free time. Tim considers himself a huge cinephile and has a collection of over 800 films and a home theater system complete with a projector and seating. Public service runs in the Murphy family. Tim's daughter is an elementary school teacher, and his son is a member of the U.S. Air Force currently stationed in South Korea.
